GLOBAL CITIZENSHIP EDUCATION (GCE)

Self Help Africa's team of facilitators continue to support teachers throughout Ireland this academic year, growing our range of interactive workshops and resources, and returning to pre-pandemic events and travel. Our programmes focus on gender equality, sustainability of food systems, poverty eradication and climate action, featuring examples from our programmes in Africa.

This term, we look forward to engaging with students and wish to empower them to act and implement real change - we have launched a new Global Student information hub on our website to guide students engaged in their schools and communities, and our workshop and resource range will expand to include Ethical Fashion to confront the social and environmental injustices that exist in the fashion industry.

At the recent BT Young Scientist & Technology Exhibition, our Special Award went to a low-cost, reusable diagnostic device which provides improved and more equitable access for the diagnosis of malaria. After some years of limited travel, our School Study Visits return this autumn allowing all recent Science for Development awardees to avail of their Irish Aidsponsored travel bursaries.

BT YOUNG SCIENTIST & TECHNOLOGY EXHIBITION

After two virtual editions in 2021 and 2022 the annual BTYSTE returned to the RDS this January and at the Self Help Africa stand we highlighted the importance of drought-resistant crops cassava and millet amongst a display of foods from African farms, and illustrated exercises to measure the height and carbon content of trees. Our research partners from Queen's University Belfast joined us and wowed the visitors with specimens of parasites, including their research on goat health.
