What we do



AGRICULTURE & NUTRITION

Over 70% of Africa's poorest people live on small farms. We help these farming families achieve their potential to grow much more and earn more from their land.



COOPERATIVES

We bring communities together working as a cooperative means farmers can access new markets and earn a better income from their produce.



GENDER

We're working to level the gender field in sub-Saharan Africa. When women receive the same support as men, yields increase 20–30%.



MICROFINANCE

RISE Malawi

Refocusing Initiatives for Sustainable Enterprises for cyclone affected families in rural Malawi.

ccording to the World Bank, Malawi is the fourth poorest country in the world. Seventy percent of the population live on less than \$2.15 per day, over half don't have an adequate diet, and nearly 90% live without electricity.

For more than 40 years, Self Help Africa has partnered with women entrepreneurs and smallholder farmers across Malawi to create market-driven solutions to hunger, poverty, and environmental degradation. Today, we are working with 350,000 people in the Zomba and Machinga districts through a 10-year initiative focused on increasing household income, food production, clean drinking water, sanitation, and renewable energy access for schools and local enterprises.

Already, this program has repaired 120 boreholes, bringing clean water to 30,000 households; distributed

132,000 pounds of improved seed; provided clean cookstoves to 72,000 families; and created more than 500 off-farm

However, in the last two years, communities have faced a series of devastating climate shocks. Cyclone Freddy — one of the strongest and longest-lasting cyclones ever recorded in the Southern Hemisphere — made landfall twice in Malawi, followed by prolonged drought. With 85% of the population relying on rainfed agriculture, these disasters have wiped out homes, farms, and critical infrastructure, threatening to undo years of hard-won progress.

This year, our Special Appeal aims to continue supporting 72,000 households by expanding access to energy, clean water, seeds,

We will also provide life-saving assistance to the most vulnerable families impacted by Cyclone Freddy — restoring their path to economic independence and ensuring the progress they had made toward self-sufficiency is not lost.





ast year, Jaimie joined us on a field visit to The Gambia, where she spent time with local teams and communities, including women oyster farmers working in the fragile mangrove ecosystems.

She witnessed how women are earning a living while leading grassroots conservation efforts to restore the mangroves that sustain their livelihoods. She also visited fruit and vegetable nurseries and met with women's groups working toward self-sufficiency. That trip deeply resonated with Jaimie and inspired her to become an ambassador for our mission.

This year, Jaimie traveled with us again—this time to Malawi—where she met remarkable women entrepreneurs like Adidja, who launched a honey business with Self Help Africa's support and is now growing her enterprise to support her family and future. Jaimie also visited schools where simple, yet lifechanging improvements—like girls'

changing rooms and clean water are helping girls stay in school and reach their full potential.

She shared: "I'd read the statistics, but meeting young girls like Mercy brought it all home. Access to private latrines and clean water may seem basic, but for Mercy, it meant the difference between dropping out or finishing school. Her story is a powerful reminder that lasting change starts with dignity and opportunity."

Jaimie continues to use her platform to amplify these stories—from sharing with her social media community to flying the Self Help Africa flag at public events.

We are so grateful to Jaimie for lending her voice, her heart, and her time to champion the full breadth of Self Help Africa's mission. From entrepreneurship and education to clean water and climate resilience, her advocacy is helping us build a more equitable future for communities across the continent.

Meet Mercy in Malawi



or a long time, a thirteenyear-old Mercy, from
Chidothi in Malawi, missed
school while on her period
because she didn't have access to
menstrual products or adequate
sanitation. The absence of a
washroom at her school caused her
difficulty and stress.

To address these gaps, Self-Help Africa helped to construct two improved latrines for boys and girls at Lufe primary school. The girls' latrine includes a separate room fitted with a tapped bucket for managing menstruation, and a disability friendly room to make it more inclusive for physically challenged learners.

"I am now enjoying the privacy and cleanliness of the changing room. I

and my friend are now able to walk around normally, full of confidence than before when we feared being made fun of by the boys," she said.

Mercy is also a beneficiary of a Solar Powered Water Supply System that has been constructed alongside the sanitation facilities, supplying water to her school and a yard away from her home, and the surrounding communities. The integration of water into the aspect of sanitation and hygiene has enhanced the wellbeing of girls like Mercy, leading to increased attendance and in the long run, improved health outcomes.

The sanitation facility and access to safe water has empowered young girls like Mercy, improving their dignity and well-being.


I am now able to attend school regularly. Just like many of my friends, I don't have to miss school during my periods.

Case Study

Meet Eviness in Malawi

or families like Eviness' in Malawi, the construction of a grain bank in their village has enabled them to improve their incomes and their lives.

The storage depot has given families in their Central Region village a place to store grain, helping ensure food security during lean periods – particularly for vulnerable groups, such as older people, people with disabilities and marginalized women. It also allows members to sell in bulk, cutting transport costs and reducing crop losses.

Their grain bank, with 42 members, is one of 89 set up in the region with support from Self Help Africa. More than 5,200 households are benefitting – two-thirds of them women.

For mother of three Eviness, the grain bank, she says, has had a positive impact on her life. With greater income, she has been able to access better quality seed and so crop yields have increased substantially.


Self Help Africa also provided training to Eviness and her peers in grain bank management, distributed starter seed packs and fertiliser, and promoted a series of new, climate-smart agricultural practices.



"When we first started the grain bank our fields would, on average, yield seven bags of maize," said Eviness. "Now, the same plots of land are producing 30 or 40 bags at harvest."

Last year, approximately 66,000 pounds of maize (that's 610 bags) passed through their grain bank, along with 40 bags of beans.

Having generated more income, families have been able to purchase livestock, pay school fees, build better homes for their families and start small income-generating businesses in the community. When we started our fields would, on average, yield seven bags of maize. Now, the same plots of land are producing 30 or 40 bags at harvest.


